A HEART FOR EDUCATION

I have been fortunate to travel across the state of Georgia and meet the most incredible teachers! It is both humbling and exhilarating to know how hard you work and how many challenges you face with such dedication and dignity!

We have set our feet on a course toward cultivating a mutual understanding of what is necessary to elevate student achievement. Indeed, it is in our best interests to do so! We share a universal desire to be more deliberate and more focused on the *right* things. How do we maintain the integrity of our classrooms in the face of so many challenges? Polonius, one of Shakespeare's most endearing characters in *Hamlet* gives timeless advice, "To thine own self be true!" Take heart – all of you – for the TEACHER remains the single-most important cornerstone of the institution of education. I believe that with all my heart! Having said that, I wish to share a few insights that have been gleaned from conversations I've had with teachers, RESA specialists, ELA Advisory Committee members, and administrators.

Here are the key shifts upon which to focus:

- ◆ Close reading strategies (increasing reading stamina)
- ◆ Text-based evidence
- ◆ Writing from sources (including multiple sources and in all genres: narrative, explanatory, argument)
- ◆ Academic language (analyze, synthesize, compare, evaluate, etc.)
- ◆ Text complexity
- ◆ Importance of argument (claim/counterclaim)
- ◆ Emphasis on informational text (across the disciplines)
- ◆ Creating a collaborative culture
- ◆ Calibrating or "norming" the scoring of essays

The greatest challenges we face are inherent in **reading** complex texts and **writing** to demonstrate a deep understanding. **Reading?** **Writing?** Sound familiar? We English teachers travel in circles, don't we?

Jim Burke (2015) advises us "to be intentional when choosing texts, topics, tasks, tests, technology, and techniques"; in other words, teach by design. Commit to "sustained inquiry," using a full range of literacies. Understand "Learning Progressions" of increasing complexity, and "emphasize depth" over breadth. It sounds easy, right? Wrong! We will focus our efforts on providing Georgia teachers with resources that can help us achieve higher goals!

Teachers, there is no silver bullet! You must rely on your own creativity and passion to create excitement for learning, to cultivate a love of learning, and to reach every child! There has never been a scripted program that can do what you do! Together, we can meet any challenge! In the meantime, remember to write positive messages on as many hearts as you can....




