Since 2004, Georgia has been proud to guide its instruction in English Language Arts via the Georgia Performance Standards (GPS). Because our performance standards have consistently ranked among the most well-crafted in the country, they were instrumental in the mapping of the long-awaited set of state standards—now adopted by 45 US states, the District of Columbia, and the US Virgin Islands.

It is not difficult to see the obvious benefits of a common set of performance standards for our nation's children.


- ◆ **Preparation:** The standards are college- and career-ready.
- ◆ **Competition:** The standards are internationally benchmarked, ensuring our students are globally competitive.
- ◆ **Equity:** Expectations are consistent for all and are not dependent on a student's zip code.
- ◆ **Clarity:** The standards are focused, coherent, and clear.
- ◆ **Collaboration:** The standards create a foundation to work collaboratively across states and districts.

What action do you need to take now? For the 2011-2012 academic year,

continue with your planned curriculum. Through our website, newsletters, and professional development opportunities, we will be providing ample education on the CCGPS well in advance of implementation. Over the next few months you will be provided with sample unit frameworks, informational webinars, live-streaming televised professional development, guidance handbooks, and much, much more. About Upcoming Professional Development Opportunities

Georgia's educators will be presented with multiple opportunities over the following months to become fully acquainted with the Common Core Georgia Performance Standards. Your ELA staff at the Georgia DOE will be delivering introductory webinars by grade level beginning October 2 and running through the third week in November. Each grade level will receive three webinar training sessions, each of which will build on the last and will present important information unique to that session. In January, a

more robust, diigital "face-to-face" training will commence via Georgia Public Broadcasting in the form of a live-streaming broadcast that will also have an interactive concurrent webinar component. These sessions will be archived upon completion and will be posted at

In addition to the webinars and live-streaming professional development opportunities, it is important that inter-

ested parties take advantage of the CCGPS documentation that is being posted on the DOE website. A comprehensive K-12 Educator Resource is available on GeorgiaStandards.Org that provides a strong foundation for implementation of the CCGPS. Additional Teacher Guidance documents will be provided over the coming weeks that provide academic vocabulary, skills/concepts, and instructional strategies for each standard as well as a side-by-side comparison of GPS and CCGPS with instructional advice for transitional standards.

What are the Common Core Standards for Literacy in History/Social Studies, Science, and Technical Subjects?

Prior attempts to teach secondary literacy have focused on the strategy of reading and writing across the curriculum. In this design, educators laid out course content first, then attempted to layer literacy strategies on top of content, all too often in a haphazard way.

Common Core makes literacy an integral part of curriculum in social studies, history, science, and technical subjects by providing a set of guiding

standards for its integration. The Literacy standards begin in Grade 6 and continue through Grade 12, and include only Reading standards (10) and Writing Standards (10); Language standards (grammar, conventions, and vocabulary) and Speaking and Listening standards are not included in cross-content literacy.

One tool that many schools in Georgia will use to implement the Literacy standards is the "Learning Design

Collaborative," or LDC, developed and piloted by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The LDC provides a set of module components in the form of a template that allows teachers to easily construct meaningful literacy instruction in a variety of content areas. Over time successful modules will be shared within the DOE's digital resource bank so that rigorous, proven material for literacy integration will be available for use by all of Georgia's educators at the click of a mouse.

On this page you will find clear icons linking you to the Common Core Georgia Performance Standards Information page as well as GSD. To find the ELA page from here, click on "Curriculum" at the top of the page. From that page, click on "Curriculum and Instruction" in the first section ("Divisions"). Underneath the "Express" link you will see "English Language Arts." Our direct URL is:

On any of these pages you can click on "Georgia Standards. Org" to go to the GSD site. Beyond the grade-level standards often accessed there, take a moment to explore the new tab at the top of the page entitled "Common Core GPS." Following the ELA link at the left on that page you will discover all of the latest resources for CCGPS that are particularly relevant to you as an ELA professional. Over the coming weeks I hope to walk you through our sites as well as entertain your questions and implement your suggestions for how we might better serve your digital needs. 

Nearly all of the lessons can be adapted for a wide-variety of grade levels. I also love the editing post-its for the Six Traits of Writing. These can be used with virtually any writing assignment.



- ◆ **Always be willing to revise** your strategies based on feedback from students, colleagues, and other trusted partners. Change can be difficult but rewarding!
- ◆ **Keep a professional portfolio.** Use a high-quality binder or portfolio to display your resume, a short summary of your teaching philosophy, successful activities you've used with students, lesson plans, and favorite projects. Each year, add any formal evaluations. Also include a copy of your certification.
- ◆ **Stay updated.** Find support from professional organizations and journals and review the latest educational policies such as Reading First.
- ◆ **Embrace technology.** Merge old teaching strategies with up-to-date reinforcements such as computers, digital cameras, and online educational tools - our tech tutor helps you integrate them into the classroom.
